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
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TOMMASO AVATI THE BALLAD OF WORTHLESS SOULS

ITALY

Inspired by true events about an entire community in Puglia that converted to Judaism just as the racial laws were being promulgated, this compelling novel follows drama of a single family.

It is 1938 and thirteen-year-old Sofia lives on a farm in the Gargano together with her large and extended family. Her father, with 'words sharp as teeth', has told her that she is slow, especially with numbers. So, Sofia wanders between the farm and the wheat field, feeling alone, different, a mistake. The only person she can talk to is her friend Pasquale, from San Nicandro, and the people there have joined a strange and mysterious sect. They don't eat salami, they strike on Saturdays, and to become real men they must cut themselves down there. Their leader, Donato Manduzio, is a shady individual who apparently sees things that others do not. It is rumored in the village that he has written a letter seeking help and protection from the one individual he should have run from: the Duce.

Sofia's father has warned her not to talk to them, it's dangerous, and they could infect her. But her loneliness and curiosity are stronger than his diffidence and her story becomes entwined with their tragic destiny.



TOMMASO AVATI THE SILENCE OF THE WORLD

"I know what it means not to hear, to live in a hushed world where you are separated from even your loved ones." this quiet world which is in many ways unattainable has become a novel of women, filled with poetry and uncompromising tenderness.

She would remember her mother forever, for as long as she lived, because her mother was deaf, like her.

But she possessed a fabulous and inexplicable power: the magical capacity to hold words in her hand.


In a perfectly normal Italian town in the late '80's, an adolescent girl goes missing. It is said she jumped on a train, ran away, but then again, she had always said that she wanted to leave. Four decades later, her four best friends meet again at a funeral, where a series of coincidences lead them to revisit the unanswered question: What happened to Luana. Their search for truth reveals the lies and deception beneath the veneer of the apparent quiet of a respectable town.

There is an ugly orange wallet on the bottom of a draw on my bedside table. It is stuffed with ugly photographs that take me back to the summer of 1990. There is Claudia, with her bangs and smoky sunglasses; Gina, a little thinner, whose damp hair falls loosely on her shoulders, and stick skinny me with my eyeglasses. Lulu had already left. I remember the mixed feelings of loss and relief in the years that followed, not knowing where she was or what she was doing. It was unsettling but life without her had become much easier, at least for us.






EMANUELA CANEPA STAY WITH ME, SISTER




After the Spanish Flu, Anita finds herself in a vulnerable situation when her stepbrother is caught stealing money. He should go to prison, but who would provide for the rest of the family? They would starve on her meager salary. She confesses to a crime she did not commit and is sentenced to spend years of labor in the female prison of Giudecca.

While Fascism rages in the real world, Anita forges an odd and intimate friendship with Noemi, a fellow inmate. Neither Noemi nor the nuns who guard them ever reveal Noemi's crime. Convinced that she has "the devil inside," they warn Anita to keep her distance. However, a bond is born between them that defies social order. Circumscribed to the stone walls surrounding them, Anita and Noemi dream of a future without a husband or a father to protect them. Anita, whose sentence ends first, will wait for Noemi, and they will open a tailor shop together. But when the day of her friend's release arrives, Anita discovers Noemi's secret. The forces of reality prove to be fiercer and less forgiving than their love for each other

Until the day she died, the infamously stingy Rosemary Severini lived by herself in Villa Freiberg. With no friends or family, the villagers could only gossip about the inestimable art collection that her wealthy grandfather was said to have amassed.

So when, upon Rosemary's death, local architect Elisabeth is called to create a foundation of the villa, she is ill-prepared for what she finds: a house filled with rubbish, not a trace of art. It turns out that the Villa is shrouded in secrets, like the divided Freiberg family, who found refuge in Tyrol, a no-man's land between Nazi Germany and Fascist Italy.

Elisabeth is determined to unravel Rosemary's past, starting with the few clues she left in a locked trunk: a gold ring and photographs of a nameless child, born with a handicap. Memories of sibling love linger in the dusty rooms and lead Elisabeth to a clinic in Innsbruck, where the horrors of Aktion T4 were perpetrated in the name of a perfect race.



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FAUSTA CIALENTE THE LEVANTINES

First published in 1961, The Levantines, a scathing portrait of expatriate life in Alexandria, the miserable bourgeois society in the years leading up to World War 2.

Orphaned, Daniela is entrusted to her grandmother, a former dancer with a controversial past. But when she dies, the girl is forced to move in with an unconventional couple that introduces her to a new political dimension. It is here that she comes of age, with Mussolini is on the rise, forcing Danila's life to be intertwined with history. A novel that conveys the complexities of the Levantine world, from the contradictions of colonialism in dissolution, to the tragedy of the World War 2, told through the struggles of anti-fascists in the Middle East.



A focal antifascist, she returned to Italy after WW2, and saw out the end of her long life in England. The author won recognition in 1974 when she won the Strega Prize.



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SIMONA DOLCE **ROSAMUND FISCHER'S REAL NAME**

A literary debut inspired by true events by one of Italy's most promising screenwriters.

In the suburbs of Washington D.C. lives an elderly woman who has erased her past until a call from a journalist forces her to reckon with her true identity.

On the other side of the telephone is a journalist, whose great uncle had fled Berlin in the 1930's. His research on Rudolph Hoess's capture led him to Virginia, where Hoess's daughter, IngeBritte has been living under the alias of Rosamund Fischer

Born in 1933 on a farm on the Baltic Sea, she grew up in a villa in Poland, a "little paradise" where, the pavilions and the prisoners of Auschwitz, simply did not exist. In this cat and mouse game with the journalist, she claims she was unaware of the sounds around her and the role her father played. But Rosamund Fischer is a liar. She has lied to her husband, her children, and she lies to herself.

SIMONA DOLCE

In 1947, Rudolph Hoess was tried and hanged in Poland. IngeBritte moved to Spain, became a model for Balenciaga and then changed her name. She might have forgiven her father, like her mother whom she nurtured towards the end of her life, but we will never know. Because there is no changing history, she rewrote her own.

A novelized first-person reconstruction of the life of the daughter of Auschwitz Commandant Rudolph Hoess. To date, all we know of her lies in a single, disturbing interview she gave in 2015.

> My whole life, I deluded myself that no one would ever discover my secret. But one day, the past found me, and I was forced to recognize the secrets I had kept from everyone, including myself.



An urn rests on an empty grave in a section of the Jewish cemetery designated for suicides and ambiguous deaths. Elena wished for her ashes to be scattered in the Moselle River, but her family chose otherwise.

Years later, Elena's uncovers a secret surrounding her death, a rewriting of memory. Born into a family of Russian exiles who had left her with a wet nurse in France, Elena grew up rebellious and non-conformist, despotic, a woman full of contradiction.

At the heart of her identity were the Dresners, their patriarch Giulio, and a successful assimilation in Italy, where they became involved in Zionism, befriending important families, like the Mussolini. With the racial laws in 1938, the Dresners were once again forced into exile. Their unwritten history tells a story that spans the 20th-century diaspora.






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SARAH SAVIOLI THE BEASTS

Half a cup of Tears

2 drops of Joy (with rising power)

2 pinches of the Spice of Life

Soak the first three ingredients in a basin with tears and emotion until properly softened.

The overwhelming power and inestimable fortune of the Agnelli dynasty, paired with the glamour and inimitable class of the legendary Fiat figure head, Gianni Agnelli, and the tragic death of his son, makes this family story unique in every sense.

Inspired by Henry Ford, the Turin-based founder of Fiat accumulated a fortune during WW1 and WW2, by providing trucks, cars, and machine guns to Italy's army. But the Agnelli family soon extended its influence by acquiring a newspaper (La Stampa), a football club (Juventus), and a host of other businesses.

By the 1980s, the Agnelli family businesses accounted for approximately 3% of the national GDP and 25% of the companies listed on the Milan Stock Exchange.

Gianni Agnelli, who passed away in 2003, leaving the reins to his grandson, was a legend in his own right. His mother was half American, and his wife, Marella, one of Truman Capote's "Swans". As "jet setters," they hobnobbed with the likes of Prince Aga Kahn, Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis, and Pamela Churchill.

Much has been written about this enigmatic family, but none with the access needed to tell the whole story, both personal and financial, including what was really going on in the shadows, where death and tragedy are as much a part of the family story as the business.







The Genius of Antiquity goes hand in hand with the emergence of religion, as we know it. But unlike many conventional narratives that ground their story in doctrines, this book tells a different story, one that respects the perspectives of ordinary people, including women, children, and slaves, who were far more concerned with strengthening their relationships with the supernatural beings This book tells their story. This book creates a rich picture of how ordinary people related to the always-present deities, and more interestingly, how they often ignored the boundaries set by their religious leaders.

Ultimately, it is the story of how we were always, and continue to be, united by fundamentally shared human aspirations.

Recognizing our shared aspirations and approaches to the unknown is not in itself a prescription for healing the fractures that divide us. But it is a start.

This book tells of a time before "religion," not because the complex of ideas, rituals, and institutions that we call religious did not exist – they all did – but because "religion" simply infused everyday living. It was inconceivable to most people in antiquity that one should, or even could, get through a day without communicating with supernatural beings. This was not "superstition," it was simple common sense.

The world was thick with invisible beings who acted as agents in the world. You would want to maintain good social relationships with them, just as you would want good social relationships with family and neighbors. It was, to use a term popularized much later by the sociologist Max Weber: an enchanted world.

Michael L. Satlow is the Dorot Professor of Judaic Studies and Professor of Religious Studies at Brown University. A specialist in religions in antiquity, he has authored several books, including *How the Bible Became Holy* (Yale UP, and translated into French and Italian).
